⁵ Then the prophet Jeremiah replied to the prophet Hananiah before the priests and all the people who were standing in the house of the LORD. ⁶ He said, "Amen! May the LORD do so! May the LORD fulfill the words you have prophesied by bringing the articles of the LORD's house and all the exiles back to this place from Babylon. ⁷ Nevertheless, listen to what I have to say in your hearing and in the hearing of all the people: ⁸ From early times the prophets who preceded you and me have prophesied war, disaster and plague against many countries and great kingdoms. ⁹ But the prophet who prophesies peace will be recognized as one truly sent by the LORD only if his prediction comes true."

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Scripture Reading: Romans 6: 12-23

12 Therefore do not let sin reign in your mortal body so that you obey its evil desires. 13 Do not offer any part of yourself to sin as an instrument of wickedness, but rather offer yourselves to God as those who have been brought from death to life; and offer every part of yourself to him as an instrument of righteousness. 14 For sin shall no longer be your master, because you are not under the law, but under grace.

15 What then? Shall we sin because we are not under the law but under grace? By no means! 16 Don't you know that when you offer yourselves to someone as obedient slaves, you are slaves of the one you obey—whether you are slaves to sin, which leads to death, or to obedience, which leads to righteousness? 17 But thanks be to God that, though you used to be slaves to sin, you have come to obey from your heart the pattern of teaching that has now claimed your allegiance. 18 You have been set free from sin and have become slaves to righteousness.

19 I am using an example from everyday life because of your human limitations. Just as you used to offer yourselves as slaves to impurity and to ever-increasing wickedness, so now offer yourselves as slaves to righteousness leading to holiness. 20 When you were slaves to sin, you were free from the control of righteousness. 21 What benefit did you reap at that time from the things you are now ashamed of? Those things result in death! 22 But now that you have been set free from sin and have become slaves of God, the benefit you reap leads to holiness, and the result is eternal life. 23 For the wages of sin is death, but the gift of God is eternal life in[a] Christ Jesus our Lord. Do not let your hearts be troubled. Believe in God, believe also in me.

The True Reward – Matthew 10: 40-42 with a little help from Jeremiah 28

Often when trying to understand and reflect on scripture it helps to read of the passages before that scripture, sometimes even the entire chapter. To get the full context it is even more important to read the chapters before and after also.

In today's Gospel Jesus is giving out some instructions to His disciples before sending them out to tell the Good News in the Galilean countryside. He knows that they are going to encounter many challenges and possible rejections, some kindly, some not so kindly. It would be better to prepare them first before they receive the rejections and opposition of people not used to hearing what the disciples are prepared to teach.

Some of the responses that Jesus warns them about are given in this passage. Some will accept Jesus through these disciples and recognize His true relationship with the Father. They will realise that Jesus is indeed the Son of God.

Others, however, will consider Jesus and by extension his disciples, to be a prophet, a holy man of God but not God Himself. They will consider but not necessarily follow the wisdom that is being taught. They will not recognize Jesus for who He is, but may look to the words as coming from God, without seeing God. People may remain skeptical of the truthfulness of what the prophet is saying and give it no heed. In fact, true prophets were rarely recognized or followed by the people they spoke to. They were usually persecuted and rarely welcomed. The truth of what the prophet is saying, and in consequence, the necessity of paying attention to what he is saying is based on the faith of the hearer. As people we tend to believe those prophets who proclaim what we want to hear. Otherwise a prophet is unwelcome or even actively opposed.

This situation is highlighted in the Old Testament scripture this morning. Jeremiah, God's true prophet, confronts the false prophet Hananiah. Both claim to be prophets. What Hananiah claims is more in line with what the people want to hear. Many times we prefer to elevate to the position of prophet the people who agree with our general way of thinking, people who make us feel good about ourselves. We do not wish to hear from those who make us feel bad or convict us of wrongdoing in our way of life. At this time of the Old Testament, Jeremiah is explaining God's punishment on the people of Judah for turning away from God's ways. Hananiah is predicting the downfall of their oppressors at God's hands. Who do you think people want to listen to more?

Others will see in the disciples' words a philosophical way to live a righteous life. They will

acknowledge that what the disciples are teaching is a good moral code by which to live by, much as Socrates and Plato taught over the years. It may even be an occasion for a good debate as to what is moral and righteous and what is wrong and evil in the world, without really recognizing the true source of righteousness in this world. Their righteousness will be based on their own presumption of their good works and deeds that they have done.

In the end though, Jesus places deeds over words. "Talk is cheap." If the person actively welcomes, and helps His disciples, that is, "gives a cup of cold water [when the disciple is hot and thirsty]", he or she truly will selflessly receive them into their life and pay attention to the message. They will not focus on what they can get out of what they do. That person will not worry about their own goodness before others or whether they are righteous in the eyes of others. They will be concerned about the suffering of those who are in need of service. These persons will be the servants of God, the ones who look to serve, not to be served. Their just reward will come as a result of their selflessness and humility to others. They "will certainly not lose their reward."

Questions:

- In this time of internet preachers, prophets, bishops and apostles proclaiming themselves as speaking on God's behalf, how can one know who is really speaking God's word?
- Have you seen people who speak God's good news of love to others but are for some reason poorly treated by others? How do you think you would have received the disciples if they had come to your door?
- Have you yourself wanted to tell someone else about God's Good News, but were concerned about the reception you might receive? Would you do anything different about it next time the occasion might present itself?
