Mathew 9:35 - 38

³⁵ Jesus went through all the towns and villages, teaching in their synagogues, proclaiming the good news of the kingdom and healing every disease and sickness. ³⁶ When he saw the crowds, he had compassion on them, because they were harassed and helpless, like sheep without a shepherd. ³⁷ Then he said to his disciples, "The harvest is plentiful but the workers are few. ³⁸ Ask the Lord of the harvest, therefore, to send out workers into his harvest field."

Mathew 10:1 - 23

10 Jesus called his twelve disciples to him and gave them authority to drive out impure spirits and to heal every disease and sickness.

² These are the names of the twelve apostles: first, Simon (who is called Peter) and his brother Andrew; James son of Zebedee, and his brother John; ³ Philip and Bartholomew; Thomas and Matthew the tax collector; James son of Alphaeus, and Thaddaeus; ⁴ Simon the Zealot and Judas Iscariot, who betrayed him.

⁵ These twelve Jesus sent out with the following instructions: "Do not go among the Gentiles or enter any town of the Samaritans. ⁶ Go rather to the lost sheep of Israel. ⁷ As you go, proclaim this message: 'The kingdom of heaven has come near.' ⁸ Heal the sick, raise the dead, cleanse those who have leprosy,^[a] drive out demons. Freely you have received; freely give.

⁹ "Do not get any gold or silver or copper to take with you in your belts—¹⁰ no bag for the journey or extra shirt or sandals or a staff, for the worker is worth his keep.¹¹ Whatever town or village you enter, search there for some worthy person and stay at their house until you leave.¹² As you enter the home, give it your greeting.¹³ If the home is deserving, let your peace rest on it; if it is not, let your peace return to you.¹⁴ If anyone will not welcome you or listen to your words, leave that home or town and shake the dust off your feet.¹⁵ Truly I tell you, it will be more bearable for Sodom and Gomorrah on the Day of Judgment than for that town.

¹⁶ "I am sending you out like sheep among wolves. Therefore be as shrewd as snakes and as innocent as doves. ¹⁷ Be on your guard; you will be handed over to the local councils and be flogged in the synagogues. ¹⁸ On my account you will be brought before governors and kings as witnesses to them and to the Gentiles. ¹⁹ But when they arrest you, do not worry about what to say or how to say it. At that time you will be given what to say, ²⁰ for it will not be you speaking, but the Spirit of your Father speaking through you.

²¹ "Brother will betray brother to death, and a father his child; children will rebel against their parents and have them put to death. ²² You will be hated by everyone because of me, but the one who stands firm to the end will be saved. ²³ When you are persecuted in one place, flee to another. Truly I tell you, you will not finish going through the towns of Israel before the Son of Man comes.

Sermons. Matthew 9:35-10:23

I'm greeting you this morning from a suburb of Los Angeles where we are with my elderly parents during this unprecedented time. From here, I have a close-up view of the current tumultuous events in the United States, a season we pray will bring real and lasting change for good in our country, and in the world. Against that backdrop, and a global pandemic, I pondered this gospel passage.

In Matthew 9 we find that Jesus has been busy! In the first 34 verses he has healed a paralytic, raised a dead girl, and inadvertently healed a woman who bled for 12 years, restored sight to two blind men, delivered a man believed to be demon possessed (which subsequently restored his ability to speak) and called Matthew to follow him. He has gained a huge following, and the pharisees aren't too happy. They say he's driving out demons by the power of the prince of demons. I notice they don't have negative words about the various healings. He hasn't infuriated them by healing on the Sabbath so what can they say?

As we enter chapter 9 at verse 35, Jesus has been traveling throughout the region "preaching the good news of the Kingdom, and healing every disease and sickness." Jesus previously announced the "good news of the Kingdom" when he stood in the synagogue (Luke 4:18) and read from the Hebrew Scriptures, "The Spirit of the Lord is on me, because he has anointed me to proclaim good news to the poor. He has sent me to proclaim freedom for the prisoners and recovery of sight for the blind, to set the oppressed free..." He was reading from Isaiah 61 which goes on to say, "...to proclaim the year of the Lord's favor and the day of vengeance of our God, to comfort all who mourn, and provide for those who grieve in Zion—to bestow on them a crown of beauty instead of ashes, the oil of joy instead of mourning, and a garment of praise instead of a spirit of despair."

The "good news of the Kingdom" is a full service good news. It is about freedom and justice for the oppressed, healing for the sick, comfort for those who mourn, and favor in the place of subjugation. It's no wonder the pharisees were looking to fault him. Though they themselves were also living in subjugation to Roman rule, oppressed and held down along with their people group, they were not about to give up the power they possessed within the pecking order of the system. His "power" and popularity threatened them.

Unlike the pharisees, Jesus is moved by the plight of the people. He looks over the crowds and feels compassion for them, helpless and shepherd-less as they are. From this place of compassion he instructs his disciples, *"The harvest is plentiful but the workers are few. ASK the Lord of the harvest to send workers into his harvest field."* He's saying, *"The need is so great! There are so few people responding to it."* He instructs them to ASK (or "pray to") God to send more workers into the places of need. There is a harvest of faith, a harvest of justice, and a harvest of healing ready to be brought in. The following 23 verses of our reading show Jesus commissioning the disciples to go out and harvest, bringing the Kingdom of God wherever they go.

Jesus instructs them to preach the good news of **freedom**, **favor**, **comfort**, **provision**, **healing**, **joy**, **and praise instead of despair**. He's sending his disciples out to *do the work of the Kingdom*.

As I read this passage, my attention fell on the word "ask." "Ask the Lord of the harvest...". Asking, also known as petition, is one of the ways we pray. We also give thanks, offer praise, invite the Spirit to speak, listen quietly, allow ourselves to be changed by God's presence, etc. But Jesus's first response as he observed the needs of the oppressed masses was compassion, followed quickly by telling his followers to ASK God to move. "Send help!" "Send workers!" This feels particularly relevant to me as I consider the circumstances of our global season. We watch the news and literally see masses in the streets here and around the world, all on behalf of oppressed populations. But many of us are practicing some degree of staying mostly at home. For some, we have vulnerable people in our households that require us to be more careful about our activities beyond home. For others, our own health issues limit us. But we are stilled called to be involved, and this ASKING is our first response. All of us can spend more time petitioning God on behalf of the oppressed. **Prayer, in some mysterious way** that I don't understand, changes things*. And so we pray for change, for leaders to listen and respond wisely, for breakthrough to happen, for protestors to be safe, for the hardhearted to be softened, for humility, forgiveness, healing, and, as Isaiah says, for justice to "roll down like a river, righteousness like a never-failing stream!"

So, our first response, then, is to ask God to move on behalf of the oppressed. Pray this continuously. Don't let up. God hears. And secondly, as followers of Jesus, we are commissioned anew to go **do** the work of the Kingdom. We are called to *"do justly, love mercy and walk humbly with our God."* We are instructed to care for the "least of these," to speak up for the oppressed, and to love our neighbors as ourselves. And there isn't only ONE way to do this. Each of us must respond in our unique circumstances with our unique gifts and personalities, and in the way we sense God leading us to respond. The key is that we DO respond. God will direct each of us as we open ourselves to being led. Therefore, may we be sensitive to divine leading, and may we follow this compassionate Jesus with great courage.
