Second reading Romans 8: Vs 1 – 11 Page 850 Life through the Spirit

Therefore, there is now no condemnation for those who are in Christ Jesus, because, through Christ Jesus the law of the Spirit who gives life has set you free from the law of sin and death. For what the law was powerless to do because it was weakened by the flesh, God did by sending his own Son in the likeness of sinful flesh to be a sin offering. And so, he condemned sin in the flesh, in order that the righteous requirement of the law might be fully met in us, who do not live according to the flesh but according to the Spirit. Those who live according to the flesh, have their minds set on what the flesh desires; but those who live in accordance with the Spirit have their mind set on what the Spirit desires. The mind governed by the flesh is death, but the mind governed by the Spirit is life and peace. The mind governed by the flesh is hostile to God; it does not submit to God's law, nor can it do so. Those who are in the realm of the flesh but are in the realm of the Spirit, if indeed the

Spirit of God lives in you. And if anyone does not have the Spirit of Christ, they do not belong to Christ. But if Christ is in you, then even though your body is subject to death because of sin the Spirit gives life because of righteousness. And if the Spirit of him who raised Jesus from the dead is living in you, he who raised Christ from the dead will also give life to your mortal bodies because of the Spirit who lives in you

Therefore, brothers and sisters, we have an obligation – but it is not to the flesh, to live according to it. For if you live according to the flesh you will die: but if by the Spirit you put to death the misdeeds of the body, you will live.

The Gospel reading Mathew 13:1-23

Jesus left the house and sat by the lakeside, but such crowds gathered round him that he got into a boat and sat there. The people stood on the beach, and he told them many things in parables.

He said, 'Imagine a sower going out to sow. As he sowed, some seeds fell on the edge of the path, and the birds came and ate them up. Others fell of patches of rock where they found little soil and sprang up straight away, because there was no depth of earth; but as soon as the sun came up, they were scorched and, not having any roots, they withered away. Others fell among thorns, and the thorns grew up and chocked them. Others fell on rich soil and produced their crop, some a hundredfold, some sixty, some thirty; Listen, anyone who has ears'! Then the disciples went up to him and asked, 'why do you talk to them in parables?' Because, he replied 'the mysteries of the kingdom of heaven are revealed to you, but they are revealed to them. For anyone who has will be given more, and he will have more than enough; but from anyone who has not, even what he has will be taken away. The reason I talk to them in parables is that they look without seeing and listen without hearing or understanding. So, in their case this prophesy of Isaiah is being fulfilled;

- You will listen and listen again, but not understand
- See and see again, but not perceive
- For the heart of the nation has grown coarse
- Their ears are dull of hearing, and they have shut their eyes,
- For fear they should see with their eyes,
- Hear with their ears,
- Understand with their heart,
- and be converted
- and be healed by me.

'But happy are your eyes because they see, your ears because they hear! I tell you solemnly, many prophets and holy men longed to see what you see and never saw it; to hear what you hear, and never heard it.

You therefore, are to hear the parable of the sower. When anyone hears the word of the kingdom without understanding, the evil one comes and carries off what was sown in is heart; this is the man who received the seed on the edge of the path. The one who received it on patches of rock is the man who hears the word welcomes it at once with joy. But he has no root in him, he does not last; let some trial come, or some persecution on account of the word, and he falls away at once. The one who received the seed in thorns is the man who hears the word and the lure of riches choke the word and so he produces nothing. And the one who received the seed in rich soil is the man who hears the word and understands it; he is the one who yields a harvest and produces now a hundredfold, now sixty, now thirty' The Gospel of the Lord

Sermon

If you skipped today's Bible readings, let me point you to Genesis 25:25 (NRSV) for a vivid newborn baby description, and save you a trip to the <u>dictionary</u>: A *mantle* is "A loose sleeveless cloak or shawl."

The family tree in our reading from Genesis shows our roots in Abraham. We come from different places, but the world's Christians, Muslims, and Jews count Abraham as a kind of spiritual great-grandfather. It's something that makes us rooted together. Today I want to share a message about rootedness.

The idea of rootedness should resonate in a congregation like Arusha Community Church, where people come from many different countries and different parts of Tanzania. Some of my ancestors were from around Arusha, my paternal grandfather was born by what's now Levolosi Primary School, just a hundred meters or so from ACC. But I am also a migrant, born in another country. Some migrants get called expatriates. Others find themselves called refugees. East Africa has <u>3.25 million</u> of them. Tanzania has <u>284,000</u> of them in the UN camps. More than <u>5 million</u> more East Africans are displaced in their own countries.

From my life in this international congregation to my work with refugees, I have found so many migrants to have a deep sense of rootedness – no matter how far they are from where they started. But it can take different forms.

Sometimes, people look for rootedness in a real or imagined past. Other times, we are rooted in our different identities – our tribe, age set, career. Some of the people I admire most are rooted in their communities. And I think the ideal Paul suggests in Romans is for us to be rooted in Christ.

in this moment in time, there's so much economic suffering, a pandemic contagion that is still rising fast in nearby countries, and righteous anger against racial injustice in America and police brutality globally. Not in generations has there been as many migrants as now, and often they are mistreated in the places where they go to find refuge. Today's readings speak to me about rootedness – that the suffering and oppression we witness in this world is connected to a lack of rootedness in community and in Christ. You and I are empowered to be part of the movement of helping people increase their rootedness in Christ.

In the parable of the sower in the reading from Matthew, we want to be the seeds that take root, that grow in good soil. But the truth is the earth in which we find ourselves – our environments – differ so much. My question is how do we put down the kind of roots that Jesus is talking about for ourselves, and at the same time make the environment into the good soil for others?

1. Let the spirit of life in Christ set you free (Romans 8:2)

• There are enough things that enslave us. Anger. Addiction. Poverty. Selfishness. Ignorance. Hunger. Our past. Predatory systems. Sin. In our reading in Romans 8, the author shows us a way to be set free from those things. We become rooted in Christ instead of rooted in our own bondage. But first, we have to recognize that we are enslaved.

2. Have no condemnation (Romans 8:1)

• If you are also a migrant like me, having a heart of condemning people will prevent you from putting down roots where you are. We are Christians in *community*. It's even in the name of our church. We need to live in community and support those who are often condemned by people, thus growing the community of believers.

3. Let God's spirit dwell in you (Romans 8:11)

• Our rootedness in Christ is a gift that comes from God's spirit. We increase that connection when we make time for it. In the stillness of the morning, clearing our minds and listening for the spirit. Seeing God in the people we meet or those we live with. Scheduling time to study the Bible.

So many of people have depression, insecurity, or self-esteem problems as part of our lives. If that describes you, know that God created you in his image and likeness and lives in you. If that describes people you know, help them to see how the spirit of the Lord lives in them. Remind them often of what Christ-like behaviours you see in them, helping them to become like the seed that is rooted in good soil. Help them see that the spirit of God that lives in them can shine so strongly that other people can't help but see it.

As we, the progeny of Abraham, set our own roots in Christ, we help others to do so, too.

Some critical questions:

Which seed is more free: The one that is rooted down, or the one that floats in the breeze? Why?
Paul spent two years unjustly imprisoned by the Romans, during which time he preached and taught about Jesus (Acts 28). Is it possible to be imprisoned and free at the same time?
What things can you do today to help others see the spirit of Christ that is within them?

Communal Prayers: The service leader leads the family in praying; think of all the people that are suffering in Tanzania now as a result of Corona, those who are sick, those who are mourning and those who have lost their jobs.

Pray for your own family at this time and in particular those who have been separated from you at this time.

Pray for rootedness that Daudi described to us in his sermon. We pray for rootedness in God at all times but especially when times like now are difficult to understand.

The service leader starts and finishes the prayers. The people who pray out loud should end their prayer with "Lord in your Mercy" and everyone else will respond "Hear our prayers"

Let us finish our prayer by saying together;

Our Father in heaven, hallowed be your name; your kingdom come; your will be done, on earth as it is in heaven. Give us today our daily bread. Forgive us our sins as we forgive those who sin against us. Lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil. For yours is the kingdom, and the power, and the glory, forever and ever. Amen.
