Last year our church made a decision to support two young Tanzanian missionaries working among unreached groups on the coast and in central Tanzania. Council celebrates that our interdenominational body can support workers from one denomination without it dividing us.

The benefits of our support can already be seen from the heart-felt appreciation expressed by these young people as they work in hard areas. Please join me in getting to know them through their testimonies in this month's issue of Glad Tidings - a young married couple and another soon to be married. Council hopes you will be encouraged by your support of Petro and Lucy to reach the Alagwa in central Tanzania, and Matthew to support coastal groups in Kilwa. These are areas where over 99% of the people are Muslims. Matthew took the Kairos course in February to grow his 'world view' on the state of Christianity today and the work remaining. Both have written Council this month and here are their testimonies.

Let us pray for these people whom we support, let us invite them to visit us later this year when convenient, let us consider visiting them in their mission fields at some point, and let us enhance our own awareness of and engagement in Christ's mission through this initiative.

TESTIMONY OF PETER AND LUCY AMMY


(Translated from Swahili)

Petro: "I was born in a non-Christian family in 1991. In 2001, I started studying in a kindergarten of the Africa Inland Church Tanzania (AICT). In 2006 I accepted Jesus as the Lord and Savior of my life. 2008 was when I joined secondary school and I graduated in 2012. I was a person who dreamed of studying a lot and going far, aiming to have a good life. That's when I decided to sit down and ask God what he planned for me to be in this life. In 2015, there were opportunities to go to study the Bible. The pastor challenged me and I saw that my heart was at peace regarding the idea of going to Bible college. On the 20/09/2015 I started my studies. By 2019 I finished my Bible college studies and was sent to the field."

Lucy: "I was born in a family of Roman Catholic believers in 1994. I continued to grow up in the Roman Catholic Faith. In 2009 my faith became more personal when I accepted Jesus as my Lord and Savior. I was a person with big goals to study and get a good job, but everything I tried to do was unsuccessful. It came to a point where I completely gave up on life. However, one day I decided to ask the Lord what is the purpose of my life? Some guests came to visit our church and encouraged the church to do Missions. When I heard that, I got a lot of peace in my heart and then the door opened to go into Mission work. I got an opportunity to study at a Mission college where I met Petro."

THE SERVICE WE DO FOR THE WAALAGWA:

"The approach in mission we do among this community of the Alagwa who have mixed Islam with traditional religion is (i) to build relationships with them by collaborating with them in social work such as farming together, participating in their celebrations, (ii) visiting them, knowing their challenges and providing services to them of prayers when they need that service. We also always ask them to give us a chance to read God's Word with them; if they agree we read it with them. (iii) We invite them and eat together with them, so we always show God's love to them in different ways, one-on-one."

TESTIMONY OF MATTHEW NDUDI NKUSSA

(Translated from Swahili)

My name is Matthew Ndudi Nkussa, I come from Pahi-Kondoa in the Rangi tribe who are almost all Muslims. Warangi are found in Kondoa district, Dodoma region, in the middle of Tanzania.

I was born and raised in a Muslim family. My parents were Muslims. My father who died in 2020, had six (6) wives and my mother was the fourth (4) wife before he died in 2006. Throughout my childhood as a Muslim, I followed all the ways of Islamic law. I used to attend what is known as madrasas. I was taught to hate Christianity and to believe that Christianity is a pagan and infidel religion. We were not allowed to have Christian friends or hang out with them in schools and other places. I grew up knowing that Islam is the only true religion and that all people are lost and will go to hell except

Muslims. When I reached the age of fourteen (14), my parents sent me to secondary school which was close to our house, so I lived at home with my father while I was studying. My mother and father divorced when I was about six (6) years old and after that I was taken and raised by my father. When I was at school I had the chance to listen to the gospel, but I really despised all Christians. Many times I used to make fun of my Christian schoolmates; I called them infidels, that is, people who are not civilized and do not know God. Throughout my childhood I was bothered by my ears, they were oozing pus and I couldn't hear well even when I was in class. Most of the time I was studying by myself. While I was preparing for exams to finish secondary education, Jesus had already put in my heart the desire to seek him and know him. I was thinking about the gospel that was being preached while I was at school. I was also very interested in the loving life of Christians, especially the pastors who were coming to teach the subject of the Christian religion at our school.

One day the head of the school announced at the parade that there would be doctors and pastors who will be treating the sick and praying for those with health problems the next day. The doctors and pastors were in the Africa Inland Church Tanzania (AICT). As I was among the people who had health problems, when it came to the second day, I secretly went to the AICT church, because we were not allowed to go to those places. After arriving there, I met a doctor who did an examination on my ears and after doing the examination he said that there are holes in the ears and bacteria that were causing pus to come out of the ears. That problem had been bothering me for fourteen (14) years. He asked me if I would be willing to see some of the pastors who were under the TIMO team and to pray with them about the ear problem. I answered "Yes, I am ready to meet them." Before praying, I was taught some teachings from the Bible and led to a prayer of repentance that I was following the words they were saying. I was ready to be prayed for in the name of Jesus, so I was prayed for. However, the pastors did not believe me that I had truly accepted Jesus as the Lord and Savior of my life, because they knew that I came from a strong Islamic family. My father was Al-Hajj and a sheikh in this religion. But I had made the decision to follow Jesus Christ as my Lord and Savior.

After about a week, I felt healing in my ears, the pus stopped coming out and I started to hear better. The healing made me hold on to Jesus more and to be strong in Christ. I continued to hide the fact that I had received Jesus and that I had been prayed for, but later I received baptism from one of God's servants, the late Pastor Addison Tanner. The news of my belief in Jesus spread throughout the village. My parents got very angry and rejected me as if I was not their child.

I lived in tears, without joy, sad and with great pain in my heart because of being separated from my parents, family, and village. My suffering was because of my faith. My brothers planned to beat me and even kill me unless I agreed to deny Jesus but I did not deny my faith. The family decided to burn my belongings such as the Bible, baptism certificate, clothes and other things. My father kicked me out of the house and told me that I am not his child anymore. He also told my brothers not to welcome me in their homes.

It was a very difficult time for me. During that period, my sister decided to take me to live with her in Arusha, but in 2005 my sister died. The death of my sister made me live in a difficult situation because she was the only one in the family who had decided to help me. However, I did not give up on my new Christian faith. Then the church decided to write me a letter to go to Kolandoto Bible Training School (KBTS) in Shinyanga for a period of six (6) months. While I was in college, I found time to pray and read the Word of God.

After completing the six-month training, I returned to my home church in Pahi Kondoa. I lived in the church area under the pastor and I was given "Bible study" sessions in the middle of the week as well as preaching on Sundays. After one year my church sent me to start a local church in another village.

Throughout that period of suffering and isolation, I learned patience, forgiveness and that God had a great purpose to prepare me for his work for every human being. I served there for six years. After that I joined the Nassa Theological College (NTC) which is under the AICT Church for a period of four (4) years to get more knowledge of the Word of God and to know the Lord Jesus more, so that I can witness to other people about Jesus with courage and understanding of the Word of God.

I thank the Lord Jesus so much that even today I am the only one in our family who was re-born in a Christian family. The Lord has given me peace and hope in my heart. I believe that one day my brothers will also receive the grace of salvation, so I continue without stopping.


